



# Individual Program Transfer Articulation Agreement

This Transfer Articulation Agreement is governed by the general Transfer Articulation Agreement Memorandum of Understanding between Kennebec Valley Community College (KVCC) and the University of Maine (UMaine). Current students and graduates who have been enrolled in or earned the identified degree from KVCC and are admissible to the University shall be eligible for credit evaluation under the terms of this agreement.

Admissions requirements: Successful completion of the Associate in Applied Science in Mental Health (C or better in MHT courses and a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 to complete the AAS in Mental Health) and a complete application for admission to UMaine.

<sup>\*</sup>A minimum grade of C- (or C for English Composition) is required for transfer credit to be awarded.

<u>Special Notes:</u> Courses taken at KVCC in which the student did not earn the required grade to satisfy either transfer credit or degree requirements would need to be retaken at either UMaine or KVCC in order to earn the grade needed to count toward the degree at UMaine. Once enrolled at UMaine, the student would need to complete a domestic study away form to alert Student Records of their plans to take any courses at KVCC.

Students who satisfy general education requirements at KVCC as specified in the General Education Block Transfer Agreement between the Maine Community College System and the University of Maine System may qualify for a block transfer of their general education credits to UMaine, those who don't will be evaluated on a course by course basis.

Students are encouraged to take their free elective or one of their remaining general education courses (Artistic & Creative, Applied Science or Population & Environment) during the summer, or May term or January term to reduce the number of credits needed to be taken in Semester 5 and 6 at UMaine.

#### Degree Requirement Notes:

Transfer students will be accorded the same standards and criteria for admission to a major degree sequence as UMaine students. All applicants accepted to UMaine's baccalaureate programs must fulfill the graduation requirements as identified in UMaine's academic catalog. For up to date degree information please check UMaine's online catalog at http://catalog.umaine.edu/. The most recent transfer credit equivalency information is available through the online transfer equivalency listing located at mainestreet.maine.edu. See appendix A for complete degree requirements as of the date of this agreement.

Students are encouraged to take their free elective or one of their remaining general education courses (Artistic & Creative, Applied Science or Population & Environment) during the summer, or May term or January term to reduce the number of credits needed to be taken in Semester 5 and 6 at UMaine.

Practicum Sequence: In the fall semester of the junior year, students must apply for permission to enroll in the first course of the Practice Sequence, SWK 361 - Generalist Social Work Practice I. To be admitted to the practice sequence, a student must have completed the social work prerequisites and/or be currently enrolled in





any not yet completed. For full acceptance into the sequence, the student must have achieved a grade point average of 2.5 or higher. Application forms are distributed in September and may be obtained from the School of Social Work. Completed application packets are due on or before October 15 of the student's junior year. Only complete applications packets are reviewed by the B.S. in Social Work Admissions Committee.

Field Practicum: Study for the Social Work major includes courses in theory, research, and practice. Study culminates during the senior year in a 400-hour supervised practicum in a social agency. In the practicum, students refine and integrate their academic knowledge and practice skills. Prior to the field practicum, students must complete the junior level field experience (SWK 395).

Graduation: A grade of "C-" or better is mandatory in all prerequisite courses, a grade of "C" in all required courses, and a grade point average of 2.50 or higher must be maintained. Students must conduct themselves in a professional manner consistent with the Code of Ethics of the National Association of Social Workers.

Ethics: In addition to academic expectations, Social Work students are expected to demonstrate professional behavior consistent with the ethics of the Social Work profession as reflected in the Code of Ethics of the National Association of Social Workers. Behavior contrary to these standards will be cause for review of the student's admission to or continuation in the Social Work major.

Behavior: Because the role of the social worker involves helping people from a variety of backgrounds and with a range of problems, it is important that Social Work students have the emotional and psychological resources to render effective assistance to those in need. After admission to the major, students who demonstrate behaviors which suggest that their own difficulties are not sufficiently resolved to be able to help and support others at this time may be asked to seek professional help or to withdraw from the program.

- \* Social Work courses marked with an asterisk (\*) must be taken during the semester indicated.
- \*\*Students may choose to meet the BSW Human Biology prerequisite by completing SWK 380: The Biological Person and the Environment OR by taking BIO 100 and BIO 208. You should note, however, that SWK 380 DOES NOT substitute for the General Education requirement. Students taking SWK 380 MUST complete two General Education Science courses. At least one General Education course must be a lab course.

Correct course sequencing is essential for the Social Work major. Social Work majors should become familiar with information on course sequencing and other requirements described in detail in the B.S. in Social Work Program Guide. Social Work majors are encouraged to review their program course plan with their academic advisors each semester to insure timely and efficient progress through their program.

Practicum Sequence: In the fall semester of the junior year, students must apply for permission to enroll in the first course of the Practice Sequence, SWK 361 - Generalist Social Work Practice I. To be admitted to the practice sequence, a student must have completed the social work prerequisites and/or be currently enrolled in any not yet completed. For full acceptance into the sequence, the student must have achieved a grade point average of 2.5 or higher. Application forms are distributed in September and may be obtained from the School of Social Work. Completed application packets are due on or before October 15 of the student's junior year. Only complete applications packets are reviewed by the B.S. in Social Work Admissions Committee.

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
